### FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Welcome to Term 2 – full steam ahead for another busy few months.

Food for thought...

Parenting is the hardest job in the world! Just saying... I am sure it is also the MOST gratifying role any human can take on and my admiration for all parents is second to none. As you know I am not a parent; however I am a beloved aunty and have been an educator for a long time. One of my strengths, I believe, is how much I care for the kids in my care – the kids of Robe Primary School - your kids - each and every one – when times are good and when times are tough!

Keeping all our kids safe is our utmost priority and responsibility as educators and as parents/carers. Living in a digital world brings a level of pressure to parents that is at times, overwhelming.

In our busy lives, sometimes we do not look at the fine print but often it is here that lie important details to arm you as parents/carers with managing the demands of children who are seeking to access digital platforms before the appropriate age of consent.

Did you know that Snap Chat, Tik Tok, You tube, Twitter and Facebook all require sign ups and users to be at least 13 years of age? Instagram actually require users to be 16+! The age restrictions trace back to the 1998 US law called COPPA (Children's Online Privacy Protection Act) that prohibits the tracking and data collection of children under the age of 13.

The tricky part here is that many platforms do NOT have age-verification processes in place so the responsibility lies with parents/carers to monitor kids screen time or at least the apps on their phones.

A few handy hints:

### Snap Chat

If children under the age of 13 do sign up for a Snap Chat account they are given access to '*SnapKidz*' which is a limitedversion of Snapchat that doesn't allow images to be sent to other devices.

### <u>Tik Tok</u>

If you enable 'Parental Controls' from Google and/or Apple, Tik Tok can be automatically blocked on any underage children's devices.

### <u>Instagram</u>

Instagram accounts that represent someone under the age of 13 **must clearly state** in the account's bio that the account is managed by a parent or manager.

### **Out & About**

On a lighter note and as usual, lots of learning happening across the school. Persuasive writing is a focus and children are learning about different types of persuasive texts, how they are structured and particular features that help position an audience. Children are learning about structure, features – such as: modality, calls to action, using statistics and emotion to convince someone to think or act in a particular way. Teachers are conferencing with students to set goals that move learning forward

Year 4/5 and 6 discussing strengths and areas of need in writing. Students then identify and set individual goals to help nudge their writing progress forward.







Year 4/5 students learning about persuasive structure and the feature of modality and how choice of words can strengthen or weaken a persuasive text.











Year 3/4 students displaying their final pieces of narrative writing – sharing how they kept improving their writing through feedback and further drafts.

**Year 2 Writing circle** – students share out their persuasive writing with classmates. In mathematics students are learning the very important idea that '10 of these equals one of these'! A foundational concept of our number system!










### Buddies

### Shorebirds

On Thursday 11<sup>th</sup> May each class walked to the outlet to meet Robbie Andrew from the Limestone Coast Landscape Board along with John and Mel from Birdlife Australia. The students were split into groups and participated in sessions on the migrating Shorebirds of Robe and the importance of macro invertebrates. Students also learnt about the incredible distances the migrating shorebirds travel on their journey to the Artic for breeding and the different species



of shorebirds we see in Robe. During the macro invertebrate session, students spent time looking for macro invertebrates in the outlet and learnt about the importance they play as indicators of a healthy water system. Nat Boulden
